
#### **Curriculum Day**

### PRIMARY MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE SPECIALISTS INITIATIVE.

Did you know that 35% of 15 year olds currently do not have the problem solving skills required for the future?

Last week Jodie Bray, Jess Szalek and Dimple Bhardwaj attended the Primary Maths and Science **Specialists** Initiative at the Exhibition Melbourne Centre. This was an amazing opportunity that provided professional learning in mathematics over the course of three davs.



A particular highlight included David Leigh-Lancaster's presentation surrounding the proficiencies that are fundamental to working mathematically. These include **Understanding, Fluency, Problem-solving** and **Reasoning** and are applied across all strands of mathematics.

### When is Harmony Day celebrated?

- <u>Harmony Day</u> is celebrated throughout Australia on **21 March**. Since first held in 1999, Harmony Day has grown to become a significant annual day for Australians to come together and celebrate our nation's cultural diversity.
- 21 March is also the <u>United Nations International Day for the Elimination</u> of Racial Discrimination.

### What is Harmony Day?

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- Harmony Day is a day to celebrate Australian multiculturalism, based on the successful integration of migrants into our community. It is an opportunity for all Australians to embrace cultural diversity and to share what we have in common.
- Harmony Day is a community celebration. Since 1999, more than 70 000
  Harmony Day events have been staged in childcare centres, schools, community groups, churches, businesses and federal, state and local government agencies across Australia.
- <u>Multiculturalism</u> is in Australia's national interest. It is about inclusiveness, respect and belonging for all Australians, regardless of cultural or linguistic background, united by a set of core Australian values.

#### National Day Against Bullying

#### Good afternoon Hillsmeade community,

Last week we had The National Day of Action Against Bullying on the 16<sup>th</sup> of March. We have had a strong focus on this over the past few weeks. We wanted to raise awareness within our community about this important topic.

Students had the opportunity to have discussions in class on bullying and how it can affect individuals and families. Students also expressed their voice about what a 'No Bully Zone' looks like at Hillsmeade Primary School. There is a fantastic display students created in the hall, please take the opportunity to have a look before the work gets distributed back to students.

Please take this opportunity to continue this vital conversation at home with your family and friends. It is imperative that we keep discussing this topic throughout the year openly and honestly to equip students with the skillset to address any bullying issues that arise.



There may be signs of bullying that you may notice, on the bullying no way website they have some useful information around this. Here is a short piece from the website:

### "Signs of bullying"

Each individual student who has been bullied or is bullying others will respond and act differently. A student's behaviours and moods can also change for a variety of reasons. However, the following are some signs that may indicate a student is experiencing bullying:

- Signs a parent may report:
- · doesn't want to go to school
- · changes their method or route to school or are frightened of walking to school
- · changes in sleep patterns
- · changes in eating patterns
- frequent tears, anger, mood swings
- · unexplained bruises, cuts, scratches
- missing or damaged belongings or clothes
  arriving home hungry.
- Students who are more likely to be bullied are also more likely to:
- · feel disconnected from school and not like school
- · lack quality friendships at school
- · display high levels of emotionality that indicate vulnerability and low levels of resilience
- · be less well accepted by peers, avoid conflict and be socially withdrawn
- · have low self-esteem
- · be relatively non-assertive
- · be different in some way".

During week 6 and 7, students of Hillsmeade Primary School have participated in dance activities. Here are some of our Prep students enjoying their dance session.










### **Canteen Reminders**
