

What do you think the **Author's Purpose** is for this book? To entertain, to







Is this book Fiction or Non-Fiction? Discuss with an adult why you think that.

Is the story actually about ants and grasshoppers? Discuss your thinking with




with an adult. Do the insects represent something else?




Does the story teach a lesson about how you should live your life? What might that lesson be? Share your thinking out loud.
