Learning Intention: To listen to and read the book about body coverings.



Facts are real information about a topic. This is a non-fiction book that has **facts** about animals.



Listen to the book.



Read along with an adult.



Choose your favourite page from the book. Write why you chose it. Write 3 interesting facts you learnt. Remember to add a picture.



Share your writing and picture with your family.





#### Learning Intention: To look at and use a glossary.



Listen to the book again.



Read to an adult.

Look at page 17.

#### This is the Glossary.

An alphabetical list of words or terms found within a specific text.

The **glossary** explains the meaning of some words found in the book.

Learning Intention: To notice and use question marks in the text.



Listen to the book again.

Read the book to someone in your family.





When we see a question mark, we know that someone wants to know something.



- Tell an adult what you know about question marks.
- Look through your book. How many question marks can you find?
- Copy two sentences with a question mark.
