Learning Intention: To learn about the Table of Contents in a non-fiction book. Table of Contents



Listen to the book again. Read to an adult.

The table of contents tells us the topics in the book and the page to find them.

Which page is about 'Parts of a Chameleon'?

Check the page. Is the Table of Contents correct?



Copy the picture on page 4. Write the information you found out about colourful lizards.





It shows you the parts of a chameleon. Does the diagram help you to learn about chameleons?




Draw a picture of an animal you know.

**Learning Intention:** To show your understanding of ' Chameleons.' Choose one or more of these activities:






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Ask an adult to help you find a short clip or book about 'Chameleons.' Write about the information you saw or heard. Draw something from the clip or book. Write a sentence about what you heard or read. Look at this chart. It's about blending colours. Use pencils, paint or even food colouring to create new colours.

If you have some cellophane, you could make some glasses using different coloured cellophane. What happens to colours when you wear your glasses?



Tell an adult about how colours can change.



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
